## Rosewood –The Early Days

We moved to Rosewood in mid-March 1975. We looked around and determined that we were the fifth family in the new neighbourhood.

For those of you who may recall 1975, winter had been over for all intent and purposes since the beginning of March. It was cold but all the snow was gone. The city had declared winter over on March 31<sup>st</sup>, which is normal for Toronto, and had put away all the snow clearing equipment.

What a shock when we awoke on Thursday April 8<sup>th</sup> to find a snow storm like we hadn't seen in years, as bad or worse than we had in January 1999. With the snow equipment all put away for summer, it took some time to mobilize a snow clearing operation. Since Rosewood was under construction and all the roads were unassumed, we were not entitled to snow clearing services by the Town. I got stuck on Alexmuir near Bushmills, trying to go to work. One of my new neighbours gave me a push and he was rewarded with a drive to work. The subdivision was in chaos. Cars were stuck everywhere. People kept coming in to look at the model homes on Alexmuir and at the bottom of Carolbreen. Many of them got stuck as well.

After numerous calls to the Town of Scarborough, we finally got proper snow removal service on the following Sunday. The plow was about to leave when I urged the driver to clear Carolbreen that had been overlooked. Since our move on to Alexmuir Blvd., a single family had moved in at the top of Carolbreen. A huge snow bank at the end of Carolbreen hid the existence of the street from the snowplow operator. He turned the plough and backed up to the curb opposite Carolbreen Square. He made a run at the snow bank and was stopped cold with no effect on the wall of snow. He backed up again but backed up onto the empty house lot opposite Carolbreen. This time he was a little more successful. The wall budged. Several ramblings later he broke through. The street got cleared and the family, who could only walk from their house, was mobile again.

Well, the weather quickly warmed up and the snow disappeared almost as fast as it had come. The Avenue Home lots on the west side of Alexmuir Blvd. between Edgeway Gate and South Shields Blvd. suddenly had intense construction activity. The concrete formers came in, set up their slabs and concrete pouring for the basements began. Next, the lumber arrived and teams of framing carpenters took over the scene. In no time, the holes that had been there since the fall began to give the appearance of a house, one by one up the street. The first of these new homes was occupied in mid-June, just seven short weeks after the concrete basement pouring began.

Finch Avenue back then was a two lane rural-like road over to Kennedy Rd. Woodside Mall did not exist. It was built a couple of years later. Did you know that Alexmuir Blvd was supposed to be named Chartland Blvd North to line up with Chartland Blvd South? The land developer for our subdivision, Consolidated Building, did not want to have the main street of Rosewood named Chartland Blvd North *because Monarch, a different land developer, had proposed the name*. For those of you who may not know, Alexmuir Blvd. was named after Alexander Muir an early Scarborough resident and schoolteacher. He is also noted for writing the song Maple Leaf Forever.

My wife and I bid farewell to Rosewood after more than 25 years in the community. The children have grown up and are living their own lives. Our needs have changed. The community has matured and its homeowners have changed over the years. Thanks to the efforts of the Rosewood Taxpayers' Association, who have worked hard to keep Rosewood "A Community That Cares". Where many subdivisions became just a collection of houses, Rosewood has actively tried to develop and maintain a community lifestyle. If you want to keep Rosewood "The Community That Cares" then you need to help make it happen. Give a little of your time to help the community and your neighbours and you will be surprised by what you get out of the experience.
